## Guidance Notes:

Work individually or in small groups.

Link from one object to the next.

If a cricket ball is the first object, students could pick tanner's clogs as their next item because they are made of the same material, were both a product of the tanning industry located in Edenbridge, the person making leather for the cricket ball would have worn tanning clogs etc.

One link is enough, but more links are better!

Students can sketch, make notes and draw diagrams to illustrate their links between artefacts.

Once they have created links between 6 collection items, students can begin to use them as a basis for a piece of creative writing, a poem etc.

Make time to share different links and students' ideas!
